FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Use of electronic media

The school has been providing students with some educational programs about the appropriate use of electronic media. This has included police talks with whole year groups about cyber bullying and the new laws about intimate images. The key messages about the new intimate image laws are:

- It is against the law to take, keep or ask for an intimate image of a person under 18
- It is against the law to share and intimate image of a person or any age without their consent.

No Violence in Schools Strategy

The Department of Education commenced this campaign about No Violence in Schools in 2019. With clear guidelines to schools about actions for specific types of behaviour, Albany SHS has been firm in dealing with students who display violent behaviour with suspension and exclusion processes.

The second stage of this campaign highlights the recording and sharing of fights through social media, and bystander behaviours. I am writing this to ensure our school community is aware that recording fights will result in suspension. It is not appropriate for students to upload and share violent materials over the internet. This is bullying behaviour and action will be taken. I would like thank and encourage parents (and students) who share relevant information with school, so that emerging issues are dealt with promptly. This will include removal of material from the internet and suspensions.

Sustainability Success!

Some fantastic progress at ASHS in terms of recycling... we have gone from sending 30kg of cardboard and waste to general waste every day to only 3kg.

We have been working hard as a school this term to focus on yard behaviour to ensure that we are all exhibiting Pride, Respect and Responsibility in the yard. This will continue to be a focus for us; three particular behaviours that are a focus for us include:

- Following teachers' directions;
- Cleaning up after ourselves;
- Not filming other students.

This final point is a very important one.

Subject selections

Mrs Firth and I have had lots of engaging conversations with our very excited Year 8s who have been able to have a say in their subject choices for the first time in their schooling careers! Their enthusiasm is contagious, and it has been fabulous to see them in the yard over the last

few weeks, poring over their Blue Sheets together and talking about their plans for their futures.

Attendance




