2023 has seen the return of many student experiences put on hold over the past several years with excursions, sporting endeavours and student leadership opportunities all going ahead and working towards building the belonging



Year 7 Overnight Camp



he year 7 camps were held for the first time in several years. After the recent disruptions to our way of life resulting from the virus that shall not be named. We were extremely proud to be able to once again offer all of our year 7's the opportunity to head to camp.

Held at Camp Kennedy we have 120 students present over 1 day and two nights, that's almost 80% of our total cohort! While there the kids enjoyed a night and day of activities and entertainment aimed at building up their connectedness and wellbeing. This included activities like sandcastle building contests on the nearby beach, team competitions in which kids had to problem solve, work collaboratively or simply avoid getting soaked through while catching an errant water balloon. One group even managed to throw and catch a balloon filled with water over almost 6m setting a new camp record.

Speaking of records I suspect we didn't break any for sleeping. While many students fell asleep exhausted by nightfall I can say without doubt that several dorms were up enjoying

the camaraderie and opportunity to meet new friends, get to know more about each other or, in at least once instance tell tales to scare each other enough that I ended up spending a restless night encamped outside their dorm so they would feel safe from their imaginations.

The three middle circles on each painting show family and friends meeting and gathering. It has woman and men sitting around the fires yarning and the little footprints are the children running around, playing and exploring while being protected by their elders.

The blue represents water, dams, lakes and oceans that we are surrounded by. The browns represent our land and the many different colours of it.

On the earth painting you will notice 4 blue circles. These are our water holes. On the ocean painting you will notice 4 earth-coloured circles. These are our islands that surround our town.

The kangaroo tracks and fish represent food and hunting and the journey through life.

Lila was the worthy recipient, being selected to join the Premiers ANZAC tour in 2023. Below is an excerpt of her winning submission.

The soldiers who went off to war overseas - most of whom had never experienced combat - found every day their lives were at risk, and often didn't know whether their efforts were making a difference. Battles important to Australia included the Siege of Tobruk (April – December 10th, 1941) and the Defence and Fall of Singapore (December 8th, 1941 - February

15th, 1942). The Australian soldiers' defence of the port town of Tobruk from German-Italian forces was vital to the Allies' control of the Suez Canal: strategically important as a trade short-cut through Africa to Europe. The Australian forces endured almost constant bombings but kept control of Tobruk until the siege was lifted in December. For their endurance they were nicknamed 'Rats of Tobruk' by Nazi propagandist William Joyce.8 The failed defence, and ultimate fall of Singapore was one of the worst disasters in Australian and British military history. Singapore was a key part of British presence and defence in the Asia-Pacific and important to Australian defence policies. Once WW2 began, Singapore's military resources went to Britain, so when Japan attacked Singapore, there were inadequate resources and Japan quickly won over the ill-prepared defenders.

The sessions will run at headspace Albany by headspace clinicians




